Client Spotlight

CHERISH CRAWFORD

Magnolia client since 2021; resident at 821 Jefferson Heights

"When I started, I was scared and quiet." noted Cherish as she recollects her first few months at her new home at Magnolia. Upon joining, Cherish was not used to structure and had limited relationship experience. Coupled with living with her developmental disability, the transition was hard on Cherish and was a challenge.

Over time, Cherish began to trust her new home. She began to make friends and started sharing how she felt. She realized that her case manager had her best interests at heart and learned that the people in Magnolia followed through on their promises. Alongside fellow Magnolia clients, Cherish engaged in day activities such as art, park walks, group therapy and community outings. She acquired new skills and learned to live cooperatively with her housemates. Occasionally, Cherish would show her broad smile.

With her ongoing personal growth and positive demeanor, along with no work experience, Cherish was a prime candidate to join the Ochsner/Magnolia Supported Employment Internship program. As one of four participants, it was during this intensive year long program that Cherish truly blossomed.

Cherish learned perseverance and determination. With the program, there were 4 rotations including environmental services and cleaning of which she did not feel comfortable; yet she did not give up. She showed up every day and did her work exhibiting her commitment and accountability. Cherish noted, "If you are afraid to do something, try it anyway."

When asked about how she feels after completing the internship program, Cherish shared how proud she was of herself and all the goals she accomplished. Her future goal is to qualify for Supported Independent Living where she can live in her own place with minimal supervision. Cherish already has applied for job openings in the new year and is determined to continue her path of accomplishments.

Jay Sevin, PhD, Magnolia Psychologist, smiles with pride as he thinks about Cherish. He noted, "When Cherish joined Magnolia, she was unsure and isolated herself. Over the past three years, with attention, care, social engagement, and structured programming, she has become a fully-fledged participating member of the Magnolia community. She has many relationships and is confident with her friends. Not only is she now comfortable speaking up and advocating for her peers, but she also has a great sense of humor and one of the principal jokesters!"

We are all proud of Cherish as she continues to live her best life in Magnolia.



MAGNOLIA CLIENTS GET THE JOB DONE

Magnolia Ochsner Supported Employment Internship 2024

In January of 2024, Magnolia Community Services entered a collaborative Supported Employment Internship program with Ochsner Health System offering a full year of intensive vocational training. Four of Magnolia's clients were accepted into the state funded pilot program. Each day, Daniel, Robbie, Stacey and Cherish were exposed to on-the-job experience learning accountability, interpersonal communication, teamwork and task specific skills. The Ochsner staff and Stacy Bell, Magnolia's Employment Coordinator, along with 3 job coaches, acted as mentors throughout the year setting personal goals, working through work issues, and providing moral support.





"The main reason why many people with developmental disabilities do not succeed in their jobs, is lack of social and interpersonal skills. On December 5th, all our clients officially graduated from the program equipped with the experience, skills and self-confidence to apply for a real-world job. Many have already applied for jobs! This graduation was certainly a proud moment for Magnolia, Ochsner and our 4 graduates and their families. The program was

a success, with state funding already in place for next year. Ochsner and Magnolia are assembling Class of 2025 with 4 new candidates.



"A major goal of the Supported Employment Internship was to provide a variety of unique and meaningful work experiences to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. By providing multiple work rotations across the year, each intern was able to gain valuable firsthand experience related to four vocational areas.
